Fragmentation of H_2^+ molecules irradiated by intense 395 nm femtosecond laser pulses: a coincidence 3D momentum imaging study.¹ JARLATH MCKENNA, A. MAX SAYLER, P.Q. WANG, BISHWANATH GAIRE, NORA G. Macdonald Laboratory, Department of Physics, Kansas State University — As the most fundamental molecule, H_2^+ is the natural choice of study to understand fast molecular response to intense ($> 10^{12}$ W cm^{-2}) short pulse (< 100 fs) laser fields. Previously this molecular ion, prepared as a fast (~ 10 keV) target, has been explored by our group using a 790 nm Ti:Sapphire laser revealing, for example, interesting structure in the ionization channel attributed to above-threshold Coulomb explosion. Using the second harmonic of this frequency (395 nm light) provides better energy resolution of photon-order dependent processes. As such we present here a coincidence 3D momentum imaging study of H_2^+ at this wavelength and compare the results to those using 790 nm light centering the discussion on both the ionization and dissociation channels. A theoretical interpretation of the results is offered.
